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## SENSITIZATION MEETINGS.

We have conducted meetings for people with disabilities and their families. These sessions serve as a platform for sharing challenges, discussing plans, and addressing other related issues that can positively impact their lives. DSW was coming up with a new project called out patient care and so this served as an inception meeting prior the project. These meetings also involved engagement with local leaders, political figures at various levels, and other influential individuals who can enlighten, educate, and sensitize our audience, as many PWDs often lack awareness about their human rights and other essential matters.

### **THE OUTPATIENT CARE PROJECT.**

In 2022, UBU launched a new initiative aimed at assisting selected families, (a total of 8 families) were selected to always be visited on a monthly basis. This project focuses on providing household chore training, offering essential family support, and creating a supportive environment for Persons with Disabilities within these families and their surroundings.

Through this project, we are actively restoring and strengthening connections between the general population and People with Disabilities thus promoting inclusion. Many people have gained a better understanding of how to coexist with, share meals, engage in activities, share laughter, and care for individuals with disabilities through our project, which involves frequent visits to their homes.

#### SKILLING

Our outpatient care project has had a profoundly positive impact on the families we visit regularly. We aspire to expand our reach to more families, provided we receive sufficient financial support, ensuring that this project benefits as many people as possible. We provide training in various skills and knowledge, such as hairdressing, crafts, and related activities. This training equips our beneficiaries with the abilities to create various items, enabling them to earn a livelihood despite their disabilities. For instance, we trained Patience in hairdressing and crafting small baskets, which has allowed her to earn a modest income to support both herself and her grandmother, with whom she resides.

Some children with disabilities may not have the opportunity to return to school, or it may not be a feasible option for them. However, by learning practical skills, they gain the independence necessary to lead fulfilling lives. This project has successfully reached out to various households, providing guidance to parents and children to prioritize attending school and obtaining quality inclusive education. In addition, we have established groups that have learned how to create washing soap using locally available materials and herbs. This cost-effective approach reduces the financial burden of purchasing soap daily, particularly given that many Persons with Disabilities live in poverty and face financial constraints.

#### EDUCATION

Some children with disabilities now have the opportunity to attend school thanks to our efforts, despite their parents initially neglecting them. We have supported parents by providing school materials and encouraging them to persevere with these children. As a result, there has been a small increase in the number of children with disabilities attending school. Nevertheless, this progress is hindered by the limited availability of special schools, such as those for the Deaf or physically handicapped, particularly in the Southwestern region, and their high tuition fees, which many parents cannot afford.

### HOME VISITS

Through this project, we are actively restoring and strengthening connections between the general population and People with Disabilities, promoting inclusion. Many people have gained a better understanding of how to coexist with, share meals, engage in activities, share laughter, and care for individuals with disabilities through our project, which involves frequent visits to their homes.

Sunday David 15 years from Kitumba subcounty is physically handicapped. He is raised by a single mother who struggles so hard to put food on the table. Sunday has got some missing toes and always gets wounds under his feet. Her mother is unable to take him for medical check because of finances and they opt for local herbs which are not helping so much. Sunday is a very jolly boy and very creative. We chose him as one of our outpatient

beneficiary because he has big dreams regardless of his disability. He wishes to learn how to repair shoes, radios and later starts supporting his mother financially and buy some scholastic materials to his young brother. With this program, we shall get him a person to train him on what he wants to learn, take him for medical checkup, buy him special shoes and provide him with startup capital to start on his future goals. His mother welcomed this program because she had wanted him acquire such skills but she was still financially down. She has a lot of hope in his Son and promises to give his physical support where need be.

### **SPECIAL PACKAGES.**

Besides out patient care, we have also ensured that families of people with disabilities which are normally living in poverty now celebrate Easter and Christmas like everyone else, providing them with food packages on these significant days. Previously excluded from such celebrations, we aim to make these occasions meaningful for them by ensuring they have something to eat. This is done annually.

### **ANIMAL PROJECT.**

How can we sustainably improve the economic situation of families with children with disabilities? This question is always on our minds and the exchange and thoughts around it have filled numerous conversations, emails and messages. I was driven by theoretical "value chains" and how they could be initiated and built up in rural Uganda. DSW asked the families what would be needed to make them economically better off, and the answers were spontaneous, honest and simple: We need Poultry, Rabbits, Piggery and Goat rearing so that we can set up a small animal farm. From the proceeds of selling the animals we can pay for what we need to pay for with money. So DSW and UBU e.V. put their heads together again and thought. The result is a concept of how this could be implemented without overburdening all those involved. The central role will be played by "expert advisors" whom DSW knows and who will advise and support the interested families.

The main purpose of this project was to empower children with Disabilities and their families. We also looked at these animals after reproducing to become a support system to the Child with a Disability and the family at large just in case a child gets sick, an animal can be sold to save a life or any other pressing need in the family.

It is a young and promising project which can bring about sustainability and financial growth in the families of Persons with Disabilities if animals keep healthy, reproduce and well cared for.

#### SUPPORT WITH ASSISTIVE DEVICES

DSW was one of the key organizers behind the 2022 wheelchair distribution event conducted by Father's Heart Ministries in Kabale District.

The majority of our recipients received wheelchairs and other assistive mobility devices, significantly enhancing their ability to move comfortably. These programs play a pivotal role in assisting People with Disabilities, who might otherwise be unable to afford such items independently.

The director of the organization, Mr. Mugwanya Francis, is himself a wheelchair user and knows from his own experience that people with paralysis/ walking disabilities are second-class citizens without a wheelchair. They simply cannot participate in anything and are excluded, over 200 families received wheelchairs. For DSW beneficiaries who got wheelchairs, it was so hard to mobilize them since most of them do not have a mobile phone, this was done via the "mobilisers" who take messages by mobile phone and then inform the actual recipients of the message also on foot, or from mouth to mouth.

## BEDROOM ENVIRONMENT

From 2022 onwards, we have also taken steps to enhance the living conditions of some of our beneficiaries, particularly by improving their sleeping quarters. It has come to our attention that many children with disabilities sleep in less sanitary environments compared to other children within their households. We have engaged in conversations with parents and, when necessary, provided bedding, as exemplified with Moreen, Patience, Junior, and Patricia.

### SOCIAL TIME

DSW invites all families who are currently benefiting from DSW's work to a joint celebration. This wonderful get-together includes information sharing, food, games and fun. A feeling of belonging, mutual acceptance and solidarity emerges.

We transport these children with their parents or caretakers in minibuses and motorbikes (boda bodas) from their villages/settlements. This action alone has made many families travel to the big town Kabale for the first time in years.

The focus of all the day's activities is always on communicating with each other, experiencing something together and simply enjoying the time together.

On this very event DSW invites Speakers from different fields to come and talk to PWDs, give them word of encouragement and also educate them of different income generating activities to live independent lives.

### CONCLUSION


